Superintendent's Message



Dear SA Family and Friends,

*“Greater love has no one
than this: to lay down
one’s life for one’s friends.”
(John 15:13 NIV)*

I am excited and blessed to be a part of the Salem Academy Christian School community. Before officially starting this

new position, the Lord gave me opportunities to see joy and beauty resonating in our school. I was able to spend time meeting students and staff while substituting as needed during busy spring moments. I even competed with staff in the high stakes, end of the year kickball game where (I think) all of us got some scrapes and bruises as we took on the sixth graders. I shared an evening with parents, hearing messages from their hearts about their learners; and was honored to see our 2023 graduates celebrate with family, friends, and community as they head towards new directions in their pursuit of the Living God’s plan for their lives. The moments in the classroom, on the playground, and walking the halls intensified my excitement for the seasons to come at Salem Academy.

Moving into the role of Superintendent at Salem Academy brings with it great anticipation as the Lord leads in new moments and experiences for His school. This includes bringing all secondary (7th-12th) together in one building and Bridge 56 (5th-6th) together in the former JH building. Burgeoning enrollment is a good problem to have. As we continue to grow, the need for more space is very apparent. Please pray with us as the Lord leads and provides for Salem Academy’s future plans and needed facilities.

God is doing amazing things in the lives of students, and I am glad to participate and be a part of His upcoming plans. I look forward to meeting the SA community and partnering with you as we experience together the exciting future of Salem Academy Christian Schools.

High school for our 2023 graduates was far from typical due to the start of the pandemic their freshman year...but look how far they have come with much to show for it!

The Student Address was shared by **Frankie Pineda-Volk '23** and **Kacyn Hiley '23**. They reflected on the reputation and legacy their class of 2023 would leave.



"Reputation. That is the word we heard most about our class throughout our lengthy time at Salem Academy. Teachers were warned about how we just didn't really seem to care about authority...And to be honest, that statement was true. However...we were also told about our potential to lead."

"...we only had one year to walk through the hallways (well, hallway) as underclassmen...We had to fill shoes that were just too big for our feet at the time. At the beginning of this year Mrs. Brownell and Mrs. Haslebach gave us a challenge...leave a legacy. Joshua 4:21-22 says, 'And he said to the people of Israel, 'When your children ask their fathers in times to come, 'What do these stones mean?' then you shall let your children know, 'Israel passed over this Jordan on dry ground.'"

"To just about everyone's surprise we rose to the occasion...we used our individuality and unique leadership skills to reach the potential we were always told we could reach...Remember the legacy we are leaving behind...Our reputation is not one of apathy or disrespect. It is one of individuality, service, and leadership."

The Address to Graduates was given by College/Career Coach and Senior Seminar teacher, Melissa Turner, sharing Psalms



139:23-24, *"Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. Point out anything in me that offends you, and lead me along the path of everlasting life."*



"Do better...not sure how many times I've said that to you all. And I need you all to know that it was not because what you did was not enough, it's because I could, and CAN, see the potential. Be better...Being a leader doesn't mean you have to make a huge worldly change - it can be lollipop moments. Each and every day, even when you don't even know what you've done. You truly can change someone's life by doing one small thing."

"Life is HARD you guys! You are going to fail. You are going to make mistakes, But you'll learn from it...You won't give up. And you'll be better and stronger because of it...Find those who will walk beside you; those who will push you from behind...Learn to control what you can control, and let go of the rest. And don't forget to give yourself lots of grace along the way! So, Seniors, I challenge you: Do better. Be better. Communicate. Write those thank you notes. Forgive and forget. Apologize...be willing to take the higher road. Be ok that you might not be everyone's cup of tea. Continue being those servant leaders we've seen bits and pieces of this year...We are all so proud of you."

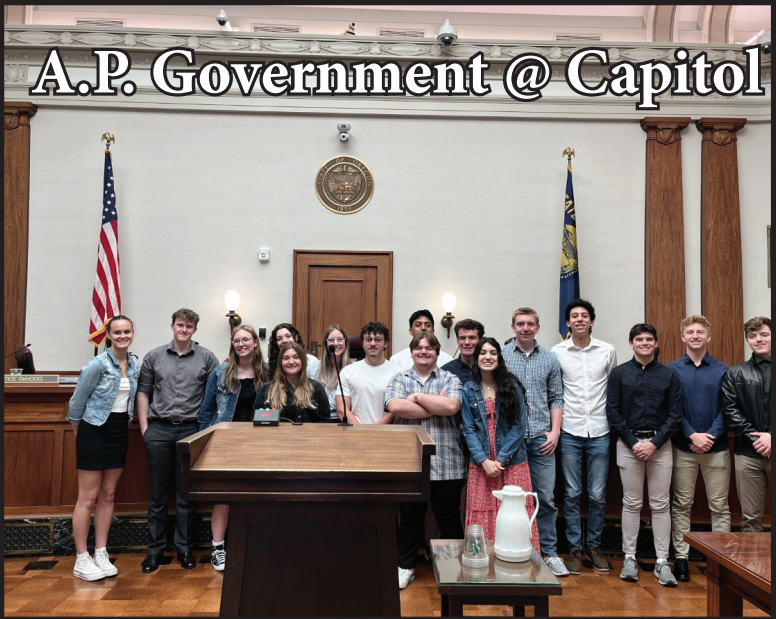

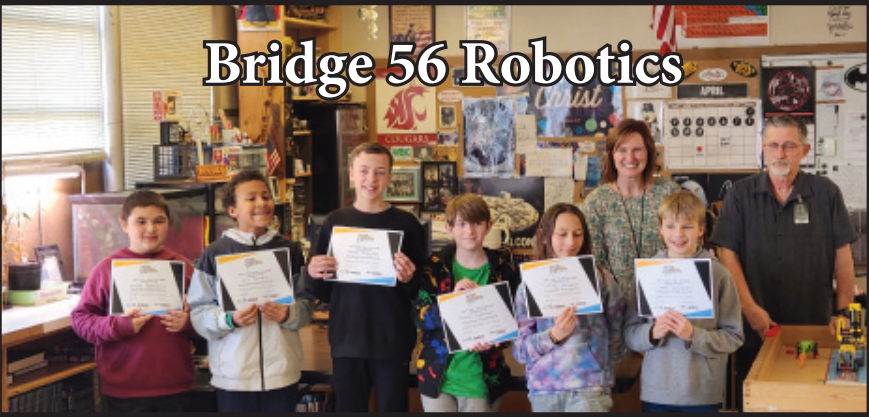

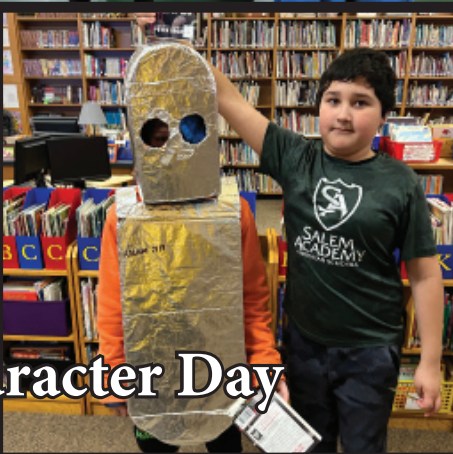
We started this year by rejuvenating our Parent Teacher Club with our Race for Education fundraiser. Thanks to the generous donations from our community we were able to raise enough to have a new playground purchased and installed this summer. We are thrilled about having our kids come back in the fall to a new playground! Our spiritual focus this year was Servant Leadership: Learning to Lead like Jesus. This theme was based on Mark 10:45 which says, "For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many." We took that theme and integrated it with the character traits found in scripture that support a description of servant leadership. ACCREDITATION RENEWAL

As you may know, Salem Academy’s high school program has been dually accredited with the Association of Christian Schools International (ACSI) and Cognia (formerly AdvancedEd). visit is an important step of satisfying the requirements to remain a 9-12 dually accredited school, as well as, adding on our K-7 grades. Being dually accredited shows our commitment to be spiritually authentic, academically excellent, and dedicated to student success. These visits allow us to receive an outside perspective to help us grow in excellence as an organization. Every step in the accreditation process is designed to be useful for driving improvement so schools

can truly flourish as they strive for academic excellence based on a solid Christian philosophy of education. For over a year our administration and others in our SA community have contributed to our self-evaluation through assessments, surveys, and research. We are grateful for the visiting team’s sacrifice of time and energy - and are pleased to announce we have been renewed and are officially accredited for K-12.

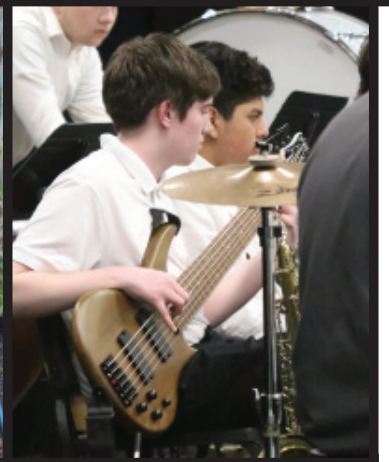


SERVICE PROJECTS

In addition to annual service projects benefitting Doernbecher Hospital, Destiny Rescue (Rock-a-Thon saving 4 kids from slavery), and Hope Pregnancy (Bottle Drive raised \$4,768!), once again students brought in food to support Hope Station. A representative shared afterwards, “*What a fabulous job you and the team have done!!! You broke the record - last year you donated 2,893 lbs. and this year....4,376 lbs. of food items! Did you know that we were very low on groceries and had an increase of about 30% of families coming for services? We were in big need for more groceries and God used you to help us out. You are a great blessing to all the families we serve.*”

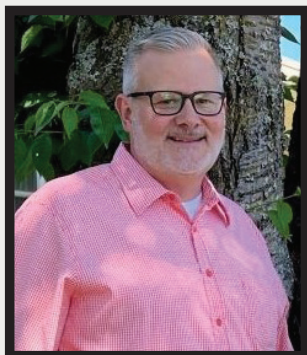

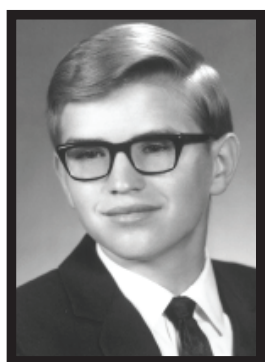

ALUMNI NEWS

SIDNEY NIEMEYER '68

I attended Salem Academy in 1963-1967 and, regretfully, left before graduating when my family moved to Yakima. I've always been grateful for the academic foundation SA gave me, but the more profound impact was learning to appreciate other Christian traditions through relationships with my classmates and teachers. I majored in physics at Calvin College, the college of my denomination, and then earned a Ph.D. in physics at the University of California, Berkeley. My research focused on the origin of the solar system through study of lunar rocks and meteorites, an unusual field for a physicist, but one where I learned to thrive in multi-disciplinary projects. Eventually, I landed my one and only career position as a scientist at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory (LLNL). In my initial assignment at LLNL, I built a research program through hiring postdocs and collaborating with university professors and students. My research expanded to include geochemical studies on the evolution of the earth's crust and mantle, as well as applying geochemical tracing techniques to hydrological and environmental issues. After serving as the Nuclear Chemistry Division Leader for eight years, I entered the most profoundly life-altering year of my life. My personal life up to this time had been relatively uneventful, raising our three children and serving



in various leadership positions in our local (non-denominational) church. Our biggest challenge was dealing with my wife's multiple sclerosis that began in her late 30s. After she bravely coped with progressive decline for eight years, she developed oral cancer. Two years later, she died.



Little did I know how God would use these experiences to prepare me for what came next. Year 2000 began with moving to a new role at LLNL where I could expand my program development efforts in the area of nonproliferation and global security. At the same time, I began a relationship with a woman (a year later we married). Only weeks into 2000, my local church asked me to become their first Executive Pastor. It was a profoundly difficult decision, but finally God made it clear I should accept the pastoral position. However, because many people urged me to stay at the Lab (including my mother, a pastor's wife), I started by doing both jobs part-time. During the seven years I worked part-time at LLNL, I made my greatest progress in developing the new field of nuclear forensics. When the Department of Homeland Security was established, I became a DHS detailee for nuclear forensics, where I served as the Thrust Area Leader for the research and development program and as the point-of-contact with the interagency to develop a national capability in nuclear forensics. Earlier, I helped to create a Nuclear Forensics International Technical Working Group, which is to this day recognized as the leading

entity for the international development of this field. Due to these and other related activities, I've been called the founding father of nuclear forensics. After serving nineteen years as a pastor, I retired in 2019. At that time, I gave myself the challenge of writing a thriller that features nuclear forensics. The book will be published in the next year, and for those who want to learn more, go to sidneyniemeyer.com.

In a sense, writing is my third career, after my careers as physicist and pastor, but all three are secondary compared to my primary calling as a follower of Christ. By far, the most meaningful aspect of my life's journey has been learning to live with greater joy and freedom through a deeper experience of my Abba Father's love and delight in me as his beloved child.

Shawnee and Jeff met at Salem Academy and would later marry and begin their family. After battling health issues, including autoimmune disease, Jeff was diagnosed with terminal liver cancer and has since been removed from the transplant list. Due to the nature of his cancer, it is inoperable, unresponsive to chemotherapy, and radiation would only make him sick. The doctors gave him several months to live since his May 3, 2023, diagnosis. Shawnee shared, "Jeff loves God and came to trust God as His Savior after reading the first Left Behind book. He has made a wonderful father who passionately loves his family, plays video games with his kids, and can cheer you up with his unique humor and personality even on the worst of days. His goal has always been to work very hard to provide for his family and give us a better life than he had growing up." While all those who know and love him continue to pray that he will win this war against cancer, the family has started a Go Fund Me page to help Jeff experience some "bucket list" adventures while he is still able to travel - they just recently returned from a trip to Europe thanks to generous donations! This summer, fellow 1991 alumni joined Shawnee & Jeff for a casual gathering in Salem to show their support. "Thank you so much to everyone who came tonight to encourage Jeff and I! The memories made will last a lifetime! We have learned that we need to cherish the moments we have because none of us knows how long we have left on this earth! God bless and keep each of you!" 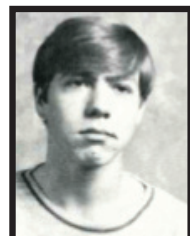
